First Reading: Exodous 12:1-14

The Lord said to Moses and Aaron in the land of Egypt, "This month shall mark for you the beginning of months; it shall be the first month of the year for you. Tell the whole congregation of Israel that on the tenth of this month they are to take a lamb for each family, a lamb for each household. If a household is too small for a whole lamb, it shall join its closest neighbor in obtaining one; the lamb shall be divided in proportion to the number of people who eat of it. Your lamb shall be without blemish, a year-old male; you may take it from the sheep or from the goats. You shall keep it until the fourteenth day of this month; then the whole assembled congregation of Israel shall slaughter it at twilight. They shall take some of the blood and put it on the two doorposts and the lintel of the houses in which they eat it. They shall eat the lamb that same night; they shall eat it roasted over the fire with unleavened bread and bitter herbs. Do not eat any of it raw or boiled in water but roasted over the fire, with its head, legs, and inner organs. You shall let none of it remain until the morning; anything that remains until the morning you shall burn with fire. This is how you shall eat it: your loins girded, your sandals on your feet, and your staff in your hand, and you shall eat it hurriedly. It is

the Passover of the Lord. I will pass through the land of Egypt that night, and I will strike down every firstborn in the land of Egypt, from human to animal, and on all the gods of Egypt I will execute judgments: I am the Lord. The blood shall be a sign for you on the houses where you live: when I see the blood, I will pass over you, and no plague shall destroy you when I strike the land of Egypt.

"This day shall be a day of remembrance for you. You shall celebrate it as a festival to the Lord; throughout your generations you shall observe it as a perpetual ordinance.


There are 5 hymns in our hymn book that begin with 'Come...sing' and 9 that begin with 'Sing'.

ST GILES NORTH ROOF RE-SHINGLING

In June of 2016 the capital refurbishment of St Giles started with the re shingling of the main south roof as the asphalt shingles needed replacement. The quality of the roof decking under the shingles was poor and so ½ plywood decking was installed.

In April 2019 as part of the capital work in this year the smaller roof at the eastern end of the Church was re-shingled with the same quality of shingles and decking replacement. The cost of these projects combined without HST was \$40,890. Using a Bank of Canada inflation calculator, the cost can be brought forward to \$48,963 in 2023 dollars.

When we concluded the capital repairs of the Church the F&M Committee decided to leave the North roofs as they do not see any sun and it was felt that they had some more years of use. This has proved to be correct, some seven years of extra life. However the shingles, especially at the top of the north roof now are showing some distress and so the two north roofs now need to be re-shingled. The specification of the roof materials was set to be the same as the south roof with modern shingle material that has a 50-year warranty life.

Two extra features were requested from the contractors. The first was to install snow bars to prevent ice chunks sliding off the small metal roof over the First Avenue entrance as this poses damage risk to any cars parked in the lane during the winter. In addition, it was requested that the contractors specify a number of passive roof ventilators of the Maximum type which are now well proven in Ottawa and would be mounted on the new shingled roof (see attached image). The Church has two large vents on the east end of the roofs and it is hoped that the three Maximum vents will provide some cooling of the roof along the roof ridge line.

Two quotes were received, one from Roofmaster at \$55,970 without HST and one from Sanderson Roofing at \$49,516 without HST. At the F&M meeting on the 31st August it was decided to proceed with Sanderson because of the significant cost saving of \$6,454 and their workmanship warranty period of 25 years. The cost of the Sanderson quote with HST is \$55,953. It would be prudent to allow for a 10% contingency which means that the F&M Committee are requesting the congregation to approve a capital project limit of \$62,000 and request the Trustees to arrange for the financing. It is expected that the work will be done this fall.
