Sermon

May the words of my mouth and the meditation of our hearts be acceptable to you. O Lord, our rock and our redeemer. Amen.

A classic article published by the Time magazine in 1988, looks into the virtue of sharing, and its corresponding opposite, that is selfishness.

Specifically, the study looks at the market of videocassette recorder, dominated then by Sony, with JVC as the upstart. Here is a quote from the article,

"The company had made a crucial mistake. While at first Sony kept its Beta technology mostly to itself, JVC, the Japanese inventor of the VHS (format), shared its secret with a a raft of other firms. As a result, the market was overwhelmed by the sheer volume of the VHS machines being produced."

We all know what happened next,

JVC's business model of sharing drastically undercut Sony's market share.

The first year, Sony lost 40 percent of the market, and by 1987 it controlled only 10 percent overall. Realizing its mistake, Sony reluctantly embraced the VHS format.

While it continued to make Beta-format VCRs, Sony's move according to Time, will likely send Beta machines to "the consumer-electronics graveyard."

Selfishness did not pay.

Sharing, as it turns out, is a virtue, even in a cut-throat business environment a lesson learned that would be applied again and again by other companies, in other fields.

Sharing is a virtue that is taught to us by our parents, and we then have passed it down to our children (or at least I hope you have). Sharing is caring.

The inclination to share is triggered by the empathetic self that recognizes the lack in others, and is then fuelled by the compassionate self to meet that lack.

Sharing, empathy and compassion are all virtues that are infectious—that is the more we share, the more others would be moved to share.

This virtuous cycle is what sustains a community, what makes the global humanity work.

So why then is the Bible seemingly teaching us 'not to share', in this week's Lectionary reading, in the Parable of the Ten Bridesmaids of Matthew 25?

The Parable, taught by Jesus, is simple enough at the first glance. Ten young women took their lamps and went out to meet with the bridegroom.

Five went prepared, bringing extra oil with them. The other five, the so called foolish ones did not. The bridegroom was delayed and all of them fell asleep.

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So by midnight, the wedding party arrived finally.

But the foolish five found themselves unprepared, lacking oil. They reached out to ask those five with extra oil to share, but was rebuffed, and was told to "go to the dealers and buy some for yourselves".

While they were away, presumedly out buying oil, the bridegroom came and welcomed the lamp-ready five into the wedding banquet.

Later, the other five, supposedly back with oil-ready lamp, came and knocked on the door, but was rebuffed again, this time by the bridegroom saying, "Truly I tell you, I do not know you."

Truly I tell you, it is a cringe-worthy parable that makes one wanting to shake that bridegroom, and questioning him, "Where is your humanity? What justice is this?"

Is Jesus teaching us 'not to share'? I don't think so, at least I hope not!

The backdrop of this parable is the coming Kingdom of God. We know this because Jesus opens the parable, in verse 1, with "Then the kingdom of heaven will be like this."

The point of this parable is to be ready for the coming Kingdom. We know this because Jesus closes the parable, in verse 13, with "Keep awake, therefore, for you know neither the day nor the hour."

The key to discern this parable is to understand what an oil-ready lamp represents.

In Exodus 27, and also in Leviticus 24,

Moses was told by God to lay out a very specific perpetual ordinance to be observed by the Israelites through all generations—that is to set up a lamp outside the tent of meeting.

They were to bring pure oil of beaten olives for the light. Aaron and his sons, that is the priestly class, shall tend it from evening to morning before the Lord.

This light shall represent the presence of the Lord in the tabernacle, and it shall be kept burning regularly, continuously a perpetual, everlasting flame.

So the best way to understand what an oil-ready lamp means, is to see it as the presence of God in each one of us. That presence is the Spirit of God. It is not a commodity, like oil, that can be readily be bought, sold, traded or shared. It can only be cultivated, individually from within.

How then does one cultivate the presence of God from within? Let me share with you this story.

Several centuries ago,

a Japanese emperor commissioned an artist to paint a bird. A number of months passed, then several years, and still no painting was brought to the palace.

Finally the emperor became so exasperated

that he went to the artist's home to demand an explanation. Instead of making excuses,

the artist placed a blank canvas on the easel.

In less than an hour, he completed a painting that was to become a brilliant masterpiece.

When the emperor asked the reason for the delay, the artist showed him armloads of drawings of feathers, wings, heads, and feet. He then explained that all of this research and study had been necessary before he could complete the painting.

Translating that to the context of faith,

all that we do in the community of faith, in bible study, in quiet devotion, in public worship and private prayers, in committee meetings, in acts of charity, in songs of praise, or visiting the shut-ins.

All these are necessary preparations that cultivate from deep within a sense of the divine, an oil-ready lamp, allowing the Spirit of God to manifest into a brilliant masterpiece.

For the time is coming, and has come, the Kingdom of God is near and is here. No one knows the hour or the day when that final consummation will happens, but we know it will happens in a blink of an eye.

Meanwhile, the community of faith is called upon to wait. This wait is not a passive do-nothing wait, but an active cultivating wait.

We can still share, not the actual presence of God, but sharing in the Good News of Jesus Christ.

We share out of empathy, out of compassion.

We share out of the realization that people hungers for meaning, and thirsts for belonging.
We share out of the realization that the world we live in is broken, and communities and individuals are all in need of healing and reconciliation.

We share out of humbleness, like fellow beggars who happen to have stumble up food and water, and are more than willing to point to others where to find this heavenly bread and living fountain.

We share out of a conviction that it is God who first loved us, and shared with us a part of the God-self, that is God the Father sharing with the humanity the only begotten Son of God, who came to the world to save sinners like you and I.

Further more God continues to share with us the Spirit of God, that forms the community of faith,

that sustains all that we do in the name of Jesus.

For without such a sharing that binds us, we would be all like chaffs, blown by the wind. For without such a sharing that empowers us, we would be all like empty vessels running on fume.

God loves so we love. God shares so we could. For that we give thanks.

The only question left to ask is this: Is your lamp oil-ready? If you are not too sure, let's have a talk.

In the name of the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit. Amen.
