Second Reading: Matthew 2:1–12

In the time of King Herod, after Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judea, magi from the east came to Jerusalem, asking, "Where is the child who has been born king of the Jews? For we observed his star in the east and have come to pay him homage." When King Herod heard this, he was frightened, and all Jerusalem with him, and calling together all the chief priests and scribes of the people, he inquired of them where the Messiah was to be born. They told him, "In Bethlehem of Judea, for so it has been written by the prophet:

'And you, Bethlehem, in the land of Judah, are by no means least among the rulers of Judah, for from you shall come a ruler who is to shepherd my people Israel.'

Then Herod secretly called for the magi and learned from them the exact time when the star had appeared. Then he sent them to Bethlehem, saying, "Go and search diligently for the child, and when you have found him, bring me word so that I may also go and pay him homage." When they had heard the king, they set out, and there, ahead of them, went

the star that they had seen in the east, until it stopped over the place where the child was. When they saw that the star had stopped, they were overwhelmed with joy. On entering the house, they saw the child with Mary his mother, and they knelt down and paid him homage. Then, opening their treasure chests, they offered him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And having been warned in a dream not to return to Herod, they left for their own country by another road.

### **Financial Update from the Treasurer**

Last year at the end of November our donations totalled \$64,965 compared to the 2022 budget of \$90,000 a shortfall of \$25,035. By year end last year, the shortfall was reduced to \$1,283 as a result of year end donations by the congregation. This year our donations at the end

of November are higher than last year at \$68,018 but we still have a similar shortfall of \$26,492. We made up the shortfall last year by giving collectively so I am asking for us to do it again this year.

### **Change of Procedure for Collection of Offering**

Session has decided to go back to using the traditional procedure for collecting the offering started last Sunday, December 24, 2023. Two ushers will pass offering plates to collect the offering. They will then carry the plates forward with the singing of the doxology and place them on the communion table. If you have any questions, please ask the duty elder.

#### **Mission Moment**

Dhai, a woman in her early forties from Pakistan, has faced hardships throughout her life. She cared for her husband, who was disabled, until his death. She later became the sole provider for her family, working as a cook for a local landowner, which allowed her to support her family. Heavy rains in Pakistan in 2022 caused her house to collapse, leaving her family without a home. Through all this Dhai remained hopeful as she explained, "If the aid comes, it will be good." Fortunately, Dhai and her family found solace and assistance through the PWS&D-supported Humanitarian, Early Recovery and Development project, which provided them with essential food aid as well as better resilience to future disasters.
